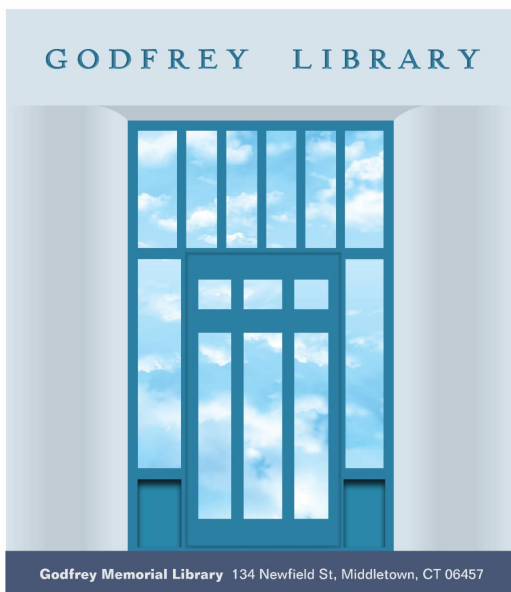
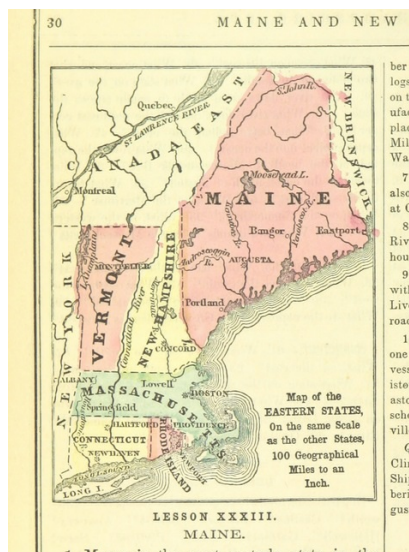

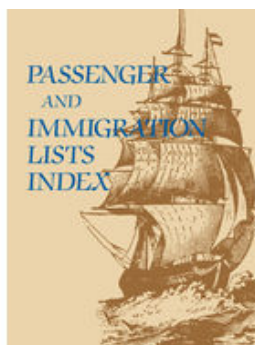

On **Saturday, July 17**, Carol Ansel will present "**Mapping It All Out: A Geographic Approach to Genealogy**"

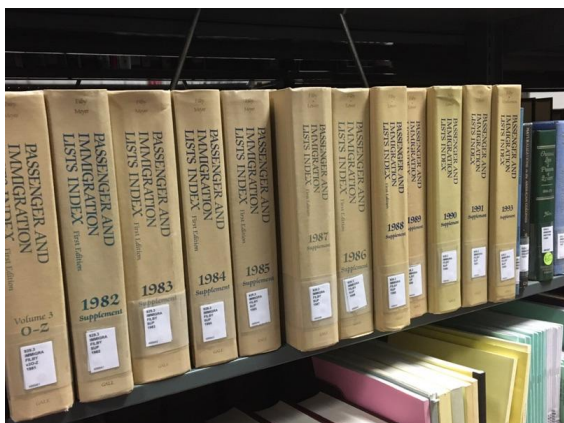
Who doesn't love old maps? Visualizing your ancestors' geographic location(s) with the help of maps can sometimes bring about new realizations.

The first 3-volume set of PILI came out in 1980 and was followed by multiple supplements. Unfortunately, the indexes weren't cumulative, so a searcher had to look in every single book.



Now with the online edition, you only have to type in the name once! You'll be presented with a list of immigration books to look in for your ancestor(s).

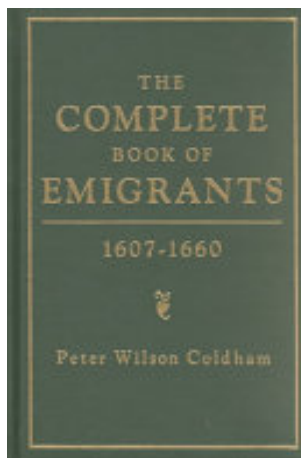

Peter Wilson Coldham's Emigration series. (was your ancestor a vagrant, rogue, vagabond or non-conformist?)

British genealogist Peter Wilson Coldham worked in the Public Records Office in London (now the [British] National Archives). Working there, he became aware of a number of unpublished data collections that he knew would be of great interest to other researchers. Accordingly he authored a number of books; perhaps his best-known are his immigration titles, which focus on "undesirables" who were sent from England to British colonies (to quote one of his titles, "felons, destitute children, political and religious non-conformists, vagabonds, beggars and other undesirables").

There are a total of seven books in the series (all available on our shelves) with frustratingly similar titles. If you do find an ancestor, don't despair--a number had been sentenced for stealing items which today seem inconsequential. These volumes are among those which are indexed in PILI (see article above). What a coincidence!
