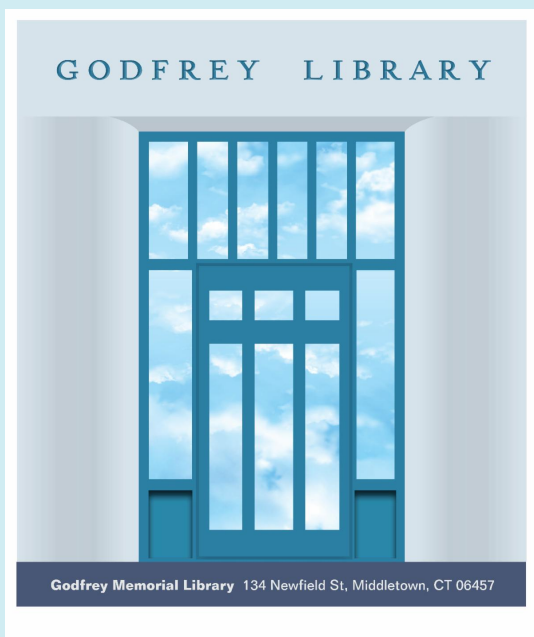
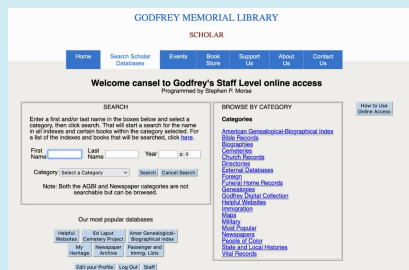

Godfrey Wins Grant

Connecticut Humanities, the statewide, nonprofit affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), has awarded Godfrey Memorial Library a **\$14,300 CT Cultural Fund Operating Support Grant (CTCFOSG)**.

This grant will be used for general operating expenses, including, but not limited to updating hardware/equipment, hiring speakers for our Genealogy Club presentations, adding new digital content to the website, purchasing new genealogical publications, and possibly even expanding hours of service.

“We’re looking forward to being able to more readily serve our current members, as well as attract new members. These funds will help ease some pressure points in our budget, and we are very grateful to CT-

Humanities and our state legislature,” says Director Carol Ansel. The Godfrey was one of 624 organizations in Connecticut that was awarded CT Cultural Fund support totaling \$16M from CT Humanities. The CTCFOSG are part of \$30.7M of support allocated to arts, humanities, and cultural nonprofits through CTH over the next two years by the CT General Assembly and approved by Governor Ned Lamont. The CTCFOSG will assist organizations as they recover from the pandemic and maintain and grow their ability to serve their community and the public.

This grant was administered by CT Humanities (CTH), with funding provided by the Connecticut State Department of Economic and Community Development/Connecticut Office of the Arts (COA) from the Connecticut State Legislature.

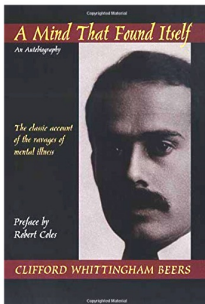

A Mind That Found Itself by Clifford W. Beers

This book can be accessed online in the Godfrey Digital Collection (GDC). To be honest, I knew nothing about it, other than the author and title when I was working on doing some maintenance on the GDC. I read the preface and was hooked.

Beers was a Connecticut native who attended Yale. In his early twenties he suffered a nervous breakdown and leapt from a fourth floor window. He landed on his feet, badly breaking his ankles and the bones in his feet, and was placed in a private mental hospital. There he suffered extreme paranoia, and later, manic behavior. For the next two years he remained institutionalized, first in the private hospital and then in the State Mental Hospital in Middletown. Though not all of his caretakers were unsympathetic, many were abusive.

Upon his release and return to mental health, Beers became a staunch advocate for mental health facility reform, with specific emphasis on non-restraint. He founded the first mental health outpatient clinic in

America, as well as the National Committee for Mental Hygiene (now known as Mental Health America).
