

### **Genealogy Club on hiatus this month**

Since we're in the doldrums of August, we will not be having a Genealogy Club this month. However, we will have Pam Vestal back again for September and October, presenting her workshop on deciphering handwriting.

#### Really exciting news -the Penny Press has been digitized at last!!

We've worked out a deal with NewspaperArchive (aka "Storied" these days) for digitization of our holdings of Middletown's Penny *Press* from its inception in 1884 to 1921. (Between 1918 and 1921 it went by *Middletown Press* and Evening Press.) They're still working on a last set of a few issues that somehow got missed the first time around, but the bulk of it is up on their site, which means it is keyword searchable!! Eventually we will have it accessible directly from our website, but for now you need to go to "External Databases" then select "NewspaperArchive."

#### Our newest additions

Here is the list of materials we have added to our collection in the last month: most of them are Biofiles that we've been cataloging. Biofiles are file folders that contain notes and/or information that we have collected from researchers over the nearly seventy-five years that our facility has been open. See if anyone else has already investigated your family. Contents vary, but may include unique items such as family charts, copies of original documents, letters, photographs -- who knows, maybe you'll find just the document you've always been looking for!

Have you had a breakthrough or success based upon something you learned through one of our Genealogy Club presentations? Share it with us! Kathy Love, of Darien, CT, Godfrey Board member who is also very actively involved with the DAR on both a local and a national level, reports on her breakthrough:

One of the skills I took to heart from an early Godfrey Genealogy Club Presentation and used to resolve a dreaded Daughters of the American Revolution AIR (Additional Information Requested) on a Virginia Supplemental Application...was how to plat a land deed. In a nutshell, the DAR needed more "proof" to successfully connect lineage of my ancestor's line to his father from the early 1800's. After exhausting all known areas to research for more direct evidence with quite a few hours at the Godfrey, I remembered an earlier platting presentation by Carol Whitmer where one can break down a land deed based on measurements known as "metes and bounds" via its described particular compass direction.

What I knew for sure, based on found land deeds, wills, probate records and county boundary maps of the time:

- -The area where the known son in my line lived and the general area where the proposed father lived.
- -The neighbors for both these men.
- -The years the Tennessee County boundaries of Wilson and Smith significantly shifted and crossed over to each other.

In 1820, the proposed father John T. Cooksey purchased a 100 Acre Wilson Co. parcel which included three tracts of land. I platted this purchase and its subsequent sales of the same tracts on grid paper including all the Chestnut, Hickory, Oak and Walnut Trees. By 1836 only a 1/2 Acre remained of the original parcel but it included its house and 1/2 the "Cooksey well." I successfully tied this 1/2 Acre parcel whose county boundaries had significantly shifted over the years to a Smith Co. land bequest mentioned in the son's father-in-law's 1842 Will via the phrase "where their father James B Cooksey now lives." Finally, this past June, my lineage to VA Patriot John Cooksey was approved by the DAR and last week I received his beautiful Ancestor Pin!
