


## Internet Archive Back in Business!


#### **Exciting New Publication!**

If any of your ancestors were early settlers of Middletown, you're doubtlessly familiar with Reginald Bacon's book *Early Families of Middletown, Connecticut, Vol. 1: 1650-1654.* For years we've been bugging Reg, "When is Volume 2 going to come out?!" Well guess what, it's here!

Allow me to quote from the publisher:

"Early Families of Middletown, Connecticut - Vol. II: 1655-1700, presents genealogical profiles of the 79 families that joined the Connecticut River settlement --- first known as Mattabeseck --- between 1655 and 1700. This volume follows the award-winning book published in 2012 that profiled the first 23 colonist families that grew the settlement in the 1650-1654 period. In addition to the comprehensive profiles, the book includes timelines, land grant maps, and

The book aims to be an information-packed resource for both descendants and historians interested in the fascinating dynamics of this "second generation" New England settlement. Higgins has compiled the family profiles from a vast array of sources from the obvious to the obscure"

# Court Records Added to FamilySearch Al Full-text Search!

Here's an explanatory video from Jennifer Dunn of Copper Mine Genealogy. If you haven't tried this Experimental feature of FamilySearch yet, you must! While it's still in a testing phase, it is live and available to the public. Those who have tried it have been very impressed, as it picks up *every* name, including abutting property owners, witnesses, spouses and family members, and even reads data from handwritten documents.

## It's Official -- The Godfrey Is Part of 10 Million Names

You may have heard of the new initiative 10 Million Names. Originating with the New England Historic and Genealogical Society and other organizations, the project is an effort to pull together and make available to researchers information about Black Americans that has previously been hidden or ignored.
