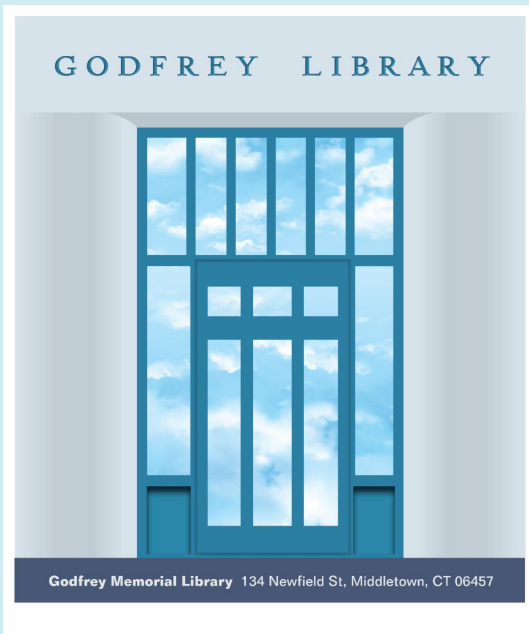

This month's Genealogy Club: Annette Burke Lyttle presents "Our Quaker Ancestors: Their History and the Records They Left"



On **Saturday, June 28**, **Annette Burke Lyttle** will talk with us about Quakers. Quakers were among the earliest settlers in North America and as they moved west, they were often the earliest settlers in newly-opened territory. Quakers were amazing record-keepers. Not only did they record births, marriages, and deaths, they also kept extensive records on those who came into their local meetings and those who left. Transgressions by members of the community were publicly discussed and recorded, and as they came to believe that slavery was evil their records on Quakers who kept slaves became extensive. Learn about the history of these pioneering Americans and how to find the rich records they left behind.

York State death records - here it is in their words:

"We just won the first-ever public release of the FULL New York State Death Index, from 1880 through the end of 2017. We won this data through a multi-year Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) suit filed against the largest government agency in the state, which eventually worked its way up the highest court in the state."

It will take some time for them to obtain the actual data, clean it up, and build a search interface, or as they put it, "as soon as they hand over the data to us, we're going to publish everything online, for free, in both searchable and downloadable formats, without any restrictions or usage contracts or paywalls, so that neither the state nor commercial entities can ever withhold it again. Because that's how we roll here. Public data belongs to — and will be returning to — the public!"

If you're a data nerd like I am, you will enjoy the [Northeast Slavery Records Index](#) site. Perhaps "appreciate" might be a better word than "enjoy," as the data is concerned with an unfortunate and unhappy facet of American history. Centered at the John Jay College of Criminal Justice, the collection includes data for ME, NH, VT, MA, CT, RI, NY, NJ and PA. It indexes information from the following sources: "US Census, slave trade transactions, cemetery records, birth certifications, manumissions, ship inventories, newspaper accounts, private narratives, legal documents and many other sources." There are a number of ways to search; you might want to start by looking at the Community-Locality reports.
